In 1993, Shuji Nakamura of Japan's Nichia's Corporation invented blue light-emitting diodes (LEDS). But Mr Nakamura received Yen 20,000 (\$ 180) for his invention, and no extra benefits. Rigid local employment practices meant that he was promoted any faster than colleagues of his own age: when he left Nichia in 1999 at the age of 45, he was earning an average salaryman's wage of Yen 16m a year. At international conference, western scientists dubbed him "slave Nakamura".

When Mr Nakamura sued his former employer for a share of profits from his invention earlier this year, he sent shock waves across corporate Japan. Nichia, he says, has made millions of dollars from LEDS, which are now used in traffic lights, household electric appliances and even medical equipment.

If successful, his lawsuit, which may not be resolved for another year, could cost Nichia as much as Yen 2 billion. The law is vague, requiring companies to pay "adequate compensation" to employees who develop profitable patents. Nichia, like many other companies in Japan, had set (cheap) rates similar to those paid to scientists at government-run-research institutes. Cocooned in the lifetime-employment system, few employees complained-at least not publicly- until recently.

Partly to soothe anti-Japanese sentiment, and partly to improve their image, the Japanese are beginning to rethink their relationship with the United States, its people, and its problems. US- style corporate social responsibility is new to Japanese business people for whom traditional ethics provide no generalized sense of charity. In Japan, 'corporate social responsibility' means taking care of one's own, the employees. The responsibility to the community at large is left to the government. In the United States, citizens have a clear incentive to make charitable contributions because such expenditures are tax-deductible, but citizens of Japan have no such incentives.

Managing globally in the 21st century is turning out to be challenging, as everyone thought, but may be for other reasons. One big international management issue has become the ethical behaviour of managers – or lack of it. For example, in Vietnam there are ongoing trials of powerful bankers and business executives who are accused of bribing government officials and police officers in order to gain favourable treatment.

The same is true in many other nations around the world. In too many developing countries, those who are willing to pay a bribe can still buy a government position. A common misperception is that unethical behaviour is common in less developed countries, but it is not tolerated or found in more economically advanced countries.

However, this does not seem to be the case. In a recent survey conducted by Transparency International, a Berlin-based organization that annually ranks countries based on how corrupt their officials are perceived to be, the United States, Germany and Japan did not fare very well.

Business people from all countries have criticized these types of rankings, contending in the case of bribes, for examples that respondents believe firms are making bribery payments because they are able to enter and do well in foreign markets where bribes are common.

On the other hand, one of the co-founders of Transparency International has noted that the deep seated suspicions of American business practices, in particular among some foreign executives, may not be groundless.

For exporters, the big advantage of pricing in their own currency is that they don't get caught out by the exchange rates changing. Generally speaking, most of an exporter's costs will be in his own currency, so it's always best to use it to price his goods. The danger of pricing in the importer's currency is that if it suddenly devalues, the exporter will receive far less than expected when the sum is converted into the exporter's own currency.

On the other hand, importers might also be worried about the possibility of a big change in the exchange rate between placing an order and paying the invoice for goods priced in foreign currency. In particular, importers who live in weaker economies where currencies fluctuate need to protect themselves. The safest way of doing this is to buy forward in the currency they need to use for a later payment. In other words, the importers contact the bank and fix the price now that they are going to pay for the foreign currency later. Naturally, they have to pay some fees and a special exchange rate for this service. Of course, if the currency in which the importer is buying then weakens, they will loose out because they could have paid less for the currency they needed. However, the reverse is also true if the importer hadn't taken steps to buy forward and in the meantime his own currency weakens, then he could end up paying a lot more.

Quite sensibly, most businesses don't want to play in the currency market. It is a huge gamble and an unnecessary risk to take. This is why exporters tend to price goods in their own currency, and importers prefer to buy forward.

Sometimes they travelled a long way in search of fresh pasture when their own land was not rich enough for their cattle to be fattened on. Sometimes they were going to distant markets when there were not enough rich people locally to buy their meat. The earliest routes followed the dry, highland, avoiding swamps and the danger of surprise attack. Later, the tracks ran along lower ground when people had settled at those levels and where spring were to be found.

- 2. Although a large number of men and boys helped to drive the cattle, the true drover was the man with the overall responsibility to the owners. He had to take complete charge of the animals for the length of the journey. He alone was made answerable for large sums of money which came from the sale of the cows, and which he would eventually hand over to the owners. He was also answerable for any misbehaviour of his men; for example, he prevented them from being cruel to the cattle, an offence which could mean imprisonment.
- This movement of animals took place over vast distances, often hundreds of 3. kilometers and required much organization, which was the sole responsibility of the drover. A constant worry was providing sufficient quantities of food for the hungry cattle, which needed enormous amounts of fodder to sustain them throughout their journey. It was like feeding an army, except that the drover had no wagon train loaded with supplies to feed his 'army' of cattle; he had to rely on the food that could be found along the way. He also showed great skill in manoeuvring these herds which sometimes numbered as many as 200 animals, often spread out over considerable distance. Frequently, he had to ride ahead on horseback to check the wandering instinct of the cattle, redirecting them along the right track, or follow behind to urge them on or bring back stragglers which had got left behind. He had to be particularly careful that the cattle did not stray into private land to feed. Such trespass could be punished by the cattle being driven into a fenced enclosure by the landowner until the drover had paid for any damage they had done. Then, too, he had to be on the look out for farms which lay on his route and blow a horn to warn the farmer of his approach, so that the farmer would have ample time to prepare. Imagine the confusion if the farmer's own cattle were to get mixed up with the travelling herd! Many hours would be spent in sorting them out and quarrels would break out over disputed ownership.
- 4. Controlling a large herd was sometimes a dangerous job. Cattle are easily frightened by sudden loud noises. For instance, a herd crossing a wooden bridge in which the planks rattle noisily would break away in uncontrollable panic and it would take hours to calm and reassemble them. The drover also had to cope with bands of robbers who might violently attack him for his money or drive off some of his cattle.
- 5. But it was the actual handling of the cattle that called for his greatest skill. He had to have an intimate knowledge of the temperament of his animals in order to judge how far and how fast to drive them. They must not be overdriven, for it was essential that they reach their market in prime condition. Rest days would therefore be necessary, because there would be keen competition between drovers arriving at an important market to get the best prices from the butchers, who could quickly assess the condition of the animals.

Fifty years after his death and 100 years after he published his ground-breaking scientific papers, his white hair and droopy moustaches still symbolize genius. Who else could it be but Albert Einstein! Einstein remains the foremost scientist of the modern era. His three scientific papers published in 1905 changed science forever. "Imagination is more important than knowledge. The more important thing is to not stop questioning." Einstein said. His first paper, for which Einstein won the Nobel Prize in 1921, described how light could behave not only like a wave but also like a stream of particles, called quanta or photons. This theory became the foundation of what is known as quantum physics. Einstein's crowning glory was his 'theory of relativity' published in 1916. It stated that space and time are interdependent and the presence of matter results in a 'wrapping' (or twisting) of space and time. Einstein described the relationship of energy and matter by the most famous equation in all of physics: $\mathbf{E} = \mathbf{mc}^2$, energy equals mass multiplied by the speed of light squared. He once wrote, "Politics is for the moment, while.....an equation is for eternity."

Einstein escaped Hitler's Germany and fled to the Unites States in 1933. He devoted his life to humanitarian and pacifist causes. After physics, space became Einstein's most important concern. In 1939 he wrote a letter to President Franklin D. Roosevelt urging the U.S. to start a program of nuclear research and develop an atomic bomb before Germany did. His opinion contributed to Roosevelt's decision to fund the Manhattan project that led to the atom bombs that exploded over Hiroshima and Nagasaki in 1945. Einstein, however, was horrified by the explosions. He later considered his letter to Roosevelt as one of his greatest mistakes. After World War II, he urged the Allies to set up a world government to control the atom bomb.

Christopher Nolan, now 22, is not only a spastic who cannot walk, stand, move his arms or talk; he also suffers from cerebral palsy, a disease of the brain which sometimes causes his limbs to jerk uncontrollably. Most people who suffer from such serious disorders live vegetative lives, and merely wait for the end – but not Christopher Nolan, or Christy, as he is affectionately known.

Nolan owes his creative life as an author not only to his own courage and determination but also to the initiative and care of his parents. Instead of leaving him to vegetate, they enrolled him in a special school in Dublin. To do this they had to give up their family farm and move to the city.

In the school Nolan learned to type. As he is able to move his head, he pecks at the keys with a stick attached to his head by a headband; and thereby converts his thoughts into written language. Doing this has not been easy, for often an attack of palsy sends his face crashing into the typewriter. However, these attacks were later controlled by a muscle-relaxing drug. Even then it sometimes took ten minutes for him to type a single word.

His breakthrough came after eleven years of "playing around with words". His early poems earned him awards from the British Spastics Association, but his first real triumph came in 1981, when Weidenfeld and Nicholson published his collection 'Dam-Burst of Dreams', which was highly acclaimed by British critics.

Nolan then went on to publish his autobiography 'under the Eye of the Clock'.

The publication of a biography of a person in his early twenties must be a rare occurrence, as few at that age would have much material to go into a biography. But this is not true of Christopher Nolan. Besides accounts of the courageous events of his boyhood, one reads descriptions of the idyllic Irish country-side, and, in contrast, stories of pranks such as cutting classes in school. These last episodes give the lie to the notion that spastics necessarily live sad and arid lives.

Close members of his family, his parents and his 24-year old sister Yvonne, have learned to read his body signs such as nods, winks and raised shoulders, and act as his interpreters whenever he is among company, as during his recent travels through the United States promoting his autobiography. As Nolan travels in a wheel-chair, his tour must have been a test of endurance, if not an ordeal.

In his writings Nolan does not attempt to play down his condition, nor does he use mild or vague expressions for words like 'brain damage', 'cripple' and 'spastic'. Conversely, he is totally conscious of his own gifts as a writer, and his great good fortune in having a family which is supportive of his desire to write. He acknowledges the existence of many other victims of palsy, even some who like him may have intellectual gifts, who are shunned and unwanted, many merely because of their physical appearance.

But Nolan is not merely a man with a mission; he is frankly ambitious, and has expressed the desire to make his mark as a writer of this decade. His success, however, is dependant on the continued support of his family.

Many Singaporeans subscribe to the mentality of "Kiasu-ism" (meaning afraid to lose) in order to get ahead in our competitive world. Indeed, many of us will testify to having friends whose schedules are cramped with all kinds of enrichment or tuition programmes because their parents are worried that their school is not providing enough instructions. Unfortunately, neither cramming nor brains hold the answers to a success story.

The top-scorers attain academic excellence by mastering a few basic principles that others can easily learn. To begin with, top students know how to set their priorities right. Study time is never compromised for phone calls, TV programmes or snacks. In other words it is always placed above recreation. Study times are strictly a matter of the students' personal preference. Some thrive at night when all is silent. Others prefer to study as soon as they come home from school when the lessons are fresh in their minds. However, all agree that consistency is a main factor if one is to perform well at all times.

A student must also learn to be organized. For example, a top student who is actively involved in his school, track and field, rugby association and debate team disclosed that he keeps his things in their proper places because he simply cannot afford time-wasting searches. Another student immediately files the day's notes in folders so that they are available near the examinations. Another technique advocated by top students is to read effectively. This includes speed-reading, improving one's memory or retention ability, and actively asking questions that will lead to a full understanding of the author's message.

It is also important for the students to know how to schedule their time. They must know how to pace each assignment, project or dateline according to their daily timetable and work ability so that they might not be overwhelmed by the tasks at hand. Being able to set timetables not only allows students more time to review and polish their work, it also prevents them from procrastinating.

In the classroom context, it is equally important for students to speak up and ask questions. This is perhaps the best way for a student to clarify any doubts. Classroom participation also demonstrates a student's intellectual curiosity.

The value of studying together was demonstrated in an experiment. The study revealed that students who discussed homework and problems together, tried different approaches and explained their solutions to one another scored higher than those who laboured on their own. The experiment also illuminated on the value of hypothetical tests conducted among the students and on their own. This means that students frame tentative test questions and give each other or themselves written examinations the day before a test. Experts confirmed that students who devise possible test questions often find many of the same questions during real examination and thus score higher.

Another technique employed by top students is to do more than the assigned homework. Last but not the least, all experts and top students agree that the most important "secret" of super-achievers lies in the crucial contribution by parents. From infancy, superachievers were taught the importance of learning by their parents. The latter set high standards for their children and held them to those standards. Instead of pressuring their children, these parents were always gentle and took pains to explain and motivate. They impressed the lessons of responsibility on their children and the children delivered.

The strategy of persuasion adopted by the advertisers in recent times is a subject of controversy. The advertisers appeal not to the intelligence of their fellow human beings

but to their fears, anxieties, prejudices and day-dreams. They insist, by the use of the words and pictures in unusual and striking combinations, that the target audience stop, take notice and get involved. They are positioned in widely differing areas of appeals: humour, drama, social service and fashion. The visuals interpret, as opposed to merely describing, the advertisement's point of view and are fresh and inventive in their own right.

Advertisers tend to have recourse to the twin techniques of market research and motivational research. The aim is to work on human frailty. Fear in various forms – fear of losing one's job, fear of failure in courtship, fear of what neighbours will think of one's clothes – is exploited. The fear of social inferiority figures in many advertisements.

In recent times the main weight of advertising has been transferred from the press to the television screen. With television advertising, words are not the only channel of appeal. In the passing moments, visual settings, the personality of the actors, the camera angles and cuttings, the background music, the catchy jingle – all contribute to the appeal. The combined effect of these multiple resources make a powerful impact. Moreover, they blare out upon the viewer when he is seated comfortably. The medium makes it possible to combine a remarkable variety of different appeals within the space of a single forty-five second commercial. It would seem that the aggressive hectoring approach is giving way to more subtle forms of appeals. The aim is to associate the product with pleasurable screen images and personalities. Soap, air-conditioners, motorcycles and tea are all linked, by the most tenuous of connections, with unfailingly benign backgrounds.

Advertising saves the manufacturers from having to think about the customer. At the stage of designing and developing a product, there is enough to think about without worrying over whether anybody will want to buy it. The designer is busy without adding customerappeal to all his other problems of man-hours and machine tolerances and stress factors. So they go ahead and make the product and leave it to the advertiser to find ways of making it appeal to purchasers after they have finished it, by pretending that it confers status, or attracts love, or signifies manliness or womanliness.

Other manufacturers find that advertising saves them from changing their product. The ideal product is one which goes on unchanged for ever. If, therefore, for one reason or another, some alteration seems called for – how much better to change the image, the packet or the pitch made by the product, rather than changing the product itself.

Individual manufacturers who allocate resources to advertising believe that this improves their sales and increases their profits. When a genuinely new product is launched, heavy initial advertising is necessary in order to build up a mass market quickly. The argument is that we live in a large-scale industrial society which is subject to constant technological change and in which mass-produced articles have to be brought to the consumer through increasingly impersonal channels of distribution. In such a society, advertising is necessary to keep the consumer informed about the new products. A further argument advanced for advertising is that it increases consumer spending and thereby helps to create high levels of employment and prosperity. In so far as this is true, the effect is accompanied by a distortion in the pattern of spending.

0.6 Rapidly increasing environmental pollution has created a deep sense of awareness among the masses of the urgent need to safeguard our habitat. Among the different types of pollution affecting our cities, only air and water pollution have received adequate attention of the environmentalists. The concern for noise pollution, which has reached alarming proportions in a number of important cities of the world, including Karachi, has been minimal. It is because of this apathy that the average noise-level in Karachi far exceeds the safe level of 55-60 decibels. In certain areas of the city, the noise levels during the daytime, have been recorded in excess of 100 decibels.

Empirical studies reveal that excessive noise levels pose a grave threat to human health and cause a number of complications. In a well-researched study on the impact of high noiselevels on human beings, it has been established that consistently high level of noise not only damages the ear drums, but also causes nausea, severe body pains and hypertension which lead to nervous breakdown and ulcers.

The real cost of noise-induced loss to industry is considered to be far greater than that of most other occupational hazards. Declining productivity among workers in certain industries, such as stone crushing, heavy steel and metal stamping and aeronautical engineering is attributable to high noise levels which adversely affect the mental and physical health of the workers. Workers exposed to high intensities of noise for prolonged periods are often found to be irritable and tense and prone to react violently even to minor differences or disagreements. Extended periods of eight hours of daily exposure to high levels of noise can cause life-long deafness.

With growing environmental awareness, some countries in Europe are beginning to take the problems of noise most seriously. In the Netherlands, zoning regulations prohibit the construction of housing projects in areas which have high levels of noise pollution, like main highways or airports. In addition, construction of anti-noise surface-porous asphalt roads reduces traffic noise by up to 5 decibels.

In the major cities of Pakistan, three-wheeler rickshaws and buses plying with defective silencers are the worst offenders. Besides, mechanical workshops in the residential areas also contribute to the menace of noise pollution. The citizens must take serious note of the threats posed by noise pollution and adopt measures and regulations to curb all kinds of noise pollution.

0.6 According to the estimates of World Health Organization, there are approximately 1.1 billion smokers in the world, about one-third of the global population aged 15 years and over. Given the gravity of tobacco-related diseases, this represents a massive burden on the world's healthcare systems. The figures related to the economic and social cost of tobacco abuse do not include the ill-effects suffered by passive smokers, persons inhaling the tobacco smoke from others. Surveys undertaken in Pakistan indicate that there are at least 22 million smokers in the country and countless others who use the substance in hukkas, shishas or in the form of chewing tobacco. While the government reportedly earns Rs. 38 billion a year, from the tobacco industry, this must be offset by the drain on the country's healthcare system which is likely to be far greater. The economic costs of tobacco-related illnesses have never been fully tabulated in Pakistan yet they are virtually certain to be colossal. Tobacco use thus puts unnecessary pressure on the subsidized state healthcare system, which is already notoriously overstretched and under-funded. At the same time, tobacco use also leads to a tangible drop in the financial comfort and quality of life of the citizens. Each pack bought as well as the treatment of consequential illness, represents a burden on household incomes.

These factors combine, meanwhile, to significantly affect the productivity levels of the workforce at a time when the country faces grave economic challenges and suffers the knock-on effects of a global recession. Distressingly, the rate of tobacco abuse appears to be growing in Pakistan, even amongst the educated young who are increasingly taking to the habit while in school or college. It is imperative that stricter measures be taken to control this menace. Earlier efforts such as banning smoking on public transport and discouraging the glamorization of the habit in the media had yielded some results. More must be done, however. Tobacco use must be banned in public areas and most importantly, regulations restricting the sale of tobacco to minors must be stringently enforced. Meanwhile, the citizenry must be educated about the dangers of using the substance in any form as there is no safe way of smoking.

Q.6 Colour blindness or a colour vision deficiency, as is commonly referred to in medical world, is the inability to perceive differences between some of the colours that others can distinguish. It is most often of genetic nature, but may also occur because of eye, nerve, or brain damage, or exposure to certain chemicals.

The normal human retina contains two kinds of light cells: the rod cells (active in low light) and the cone cells (active in normal daylight). Normally, there are three kinds of cones, each containing a different pigment, which are activated when the pigments absorb light. The absorption spectra of the cones differ; one is maximally sensitive to short wavelengths, one to medium wavelengths and the third to long wavelengths, with their peak sensitivities in the blue, yellowish-green and yellow regions of the spectrum, respectively. The absorption spectra of all three systems cover much of the visible spectrum.

Many of the genes involved in colour vision are on the X chromosome. Men only have one while women have two X chromosomes, making colour blindness more common in males than in females. There are some studies which conclude that colour blind individuals are better at penetrating certain colour camouflages and it has been suggested that this may be the evolutionary explanation for the surprisingly high frequency of congenital red-green colour blindness.

The Ishihara colour test, which consists of a series of pictures of coloured spots, is the test most often used to diagnose red-green colour deficiencies. The full set of tests has a variety of figure/background colour combinations, and enable diagnosis of which particular visual defect is present. However, the Ishihara colour test is criticized for containing only numerals and thus not being useful for young children, who have not yet learned to use numerals. For this reason, alternative colour vision tests were developed using only symbols (square, circle, car).

There is generally no treatment to cure colour deficiencies. However, certain types of tinted filters and contact lenses may help an individual to better distinguish different colours.

The journalist Eric Weiner traveled to various countries around the world. He also travelled to Iceland because studies show that it is one of the happiest nations. Mr. Weiner at first could not understand why a country with so little sunlight in the winter and so many alcohol drinkers could be so happy. Finally, he was able to conclude that happiness in Iceland is linked to its close community ties, natural beauty and high levels of creativity.

Dan Gilbert who teaches psychology at Harvard University, says about "Impact bias" that events we believe will bring us happiness bring us less happiness than we think. And, events we fear will make us unhappy make us less unhappy than we believe. R. Layard, a British lawmaker believes that public policy should help people by improving the things that lead to happiness such as job security and health.

- Q.7 Mental illness has carried a deep feeling of stigma in most societies since a long time and mentally handicapped individuals were usually confined to their homes - hidden away from the people. The stigma was attributable to the unfounded perception that mental illness was due to some innate personal weakness which undermined the social standing of the close family members in the eyes of others. So, while medical treatment and care was readily sought for physical illnesses, psychiatric disorder was generally resented and was the reason for not seeking proper treatment and care. Also, people generally avoided proper psychiatric treatment as it was believed that such treatment was needed only for those who were insane and anyone who visited a psychiatrist would be labeled as a mad person.

The reasons for this attitude towards mental illness were illiteracy and ignorance, a perception of family disgrace and stigma associated with mental illness along with the high cost of proper treatment. Even when medical treatment was sought for mental problems, it was usually from those doctors who were not adequately trained to diagnose and treat mental illnesses. In certain illiterate quarters, there still exists a perception that marriage would help the patient to overcome the ill-effects of mental disorder, but it almost always compounds the problems and brings misery and sufferings to another normal person.

In recent times there is a sharp increase in the number of cases of individuals who are suffering from various degrees of mental illnesses and bouts of depressions due to unhealthy living conditions. Rising poverty, social pressures, physical violence and the overall deterioration in the social structure are creating fear and anxiety among the people and a considerable number of patients are undergoing depression and post-traumatic stress syndrome. Gender discrimination, bias and human rights violations are other issues which are responsible for psychological disturbances.

Unfortunately, in our society, a very large proportion of the people still do not seek treatment for mental illness. They usually attribute mental disorders to possession of the human spirit by jinns, evil eye or evil influence, black magic and witchcraft and seek help from sources such as pirs and other faith healers. These healers rely on amulets, holy water, secret potions and prescriptions, etc as their tools for 'treatment'.

However, this situation is changing gradually and people are now beginning to understand that psychiatric illnesses too have a biological basis and can be treated like any other health disorder. We still have a long way to go to overcome the many deep-rooted misconceptions and biases that people have about mental health.

Q.9 In its widest sense, government means the framework and rules by which decisions that affect a community as a whole are arrived at and carried out. In a narrower sense, however, government is a person or body of persons giving effect to the framework or rules. There are different forms of governments depending on the manner in which a government is run such as monarchies, military dictatorships, civilian dictatorships and democracies. Monarchs, military men and civilian dictators often wield unlimited power which might result into tyranny and despotism. A democratically elected government exercises power and authority granted by the constitution and traditions.

A government is good, if it aims for the good of the people. The primary objectives for which such a government comes into existence are to maintain the rule of law, look after its citizens without discrimination and fulfil their needs and work towards the establishment of welfare programmes for the people. Only a government that has come into existence as an expression of the will of the people and adopts policies for the welfare of the people will have popular support. For this reason, a democratically elected government is certainly preferable to a benevolent dictatorship.

In the real world there are three important qualities which citizens look for in their governments. The first is that the government should be representative; the second, that it should provide a reasonable degree of stability; and the third that it should look after the well being of its citizens.

The citizens of a country may sometimes demand policies that are short-sighted and disastrous in the long run. This is often seen in regard to economic policies. A good government is one that formulates and implements policies that are beneficial for the citizens and also ensure future prosperity of the country. That is to say, a good government should be expected to think for the future as well as act for the present requirements - about defence, economic development, education and employment.

A good government should rise above the narrow views of the people and take measures, however unpopular and repugnant they may be when they are taken, to solve present problems and ensure a bright future. It must be prepared to accept constructive criticism and enter into a dialogue with dissident groups with a view to making its policies and measures acceptable. It always aims at the good of the people. The men and women forming such a government are persons who have the support of the people with them in good or bad times.

To conclude, it may be said that a representative government i.e. a democratically elected government which is stable and which can act with circumspection and vision for the prosperity and welfare of its citizens as well as for the future of the nation as a whole is to be considered a good government. A good government should therefore take cognisance of what years ago Jean-Paul Rousseau wrote in his *Du Contract Social* about the ultimate source of authority of a good government. According to him the government is only an agent of the people in whom vests the ultimate source of authority and for whom the government is functioning.

Q.11 Exercise is a powerful activity people can do regularly to improve health. Exercise plays an important part in reducing weight, improving pulse rate, increasing lung capacity and maintaining equilibrium in blood pressure.

Psychological benefits of exercise are impressive for mentally healthy individuals, but are even stronger for mentally-challenged persons. Although benefits of exercise towards good mental health are less recognized, recent research supports the existence of lasting relationship between regular exercise and mental health. Evidence shows that regular exercise can prevent dementia later in life.

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Thirty minutes of exercise e.g. swimming, walking or jogging and other aerobic exercises, 3-5 times a week improves mood and can prevent depression in both mentally fit as well as mentally-challenged individuals. Persons doing 3 or more hours of sports a week are 30 percent less likely to experience depression than those who do not engage in sports activities. Benefits of exercise are more apparent if one pursues the program for four months and more.

Regular exercise by busy executives helps to:

- divert attention from stress and worry
- improve self-esteem and induce a sense of mastery which overcomes depression
- elevate body temperature which reduces muscle stiffness similar to the effects of saunas and steam baths
- increase level of alertness and concentration.

Mentally-challenged persons have reported that exercise reduces anxiety, lifts their moods and increases their self-esteem.

Tiredness, busy work schedule and lack of motivation are usual reasons and laziness is often the cause for not exercising.

Group exercise activities are particularly useful for those who are socially isolated. Outdoor activity in pleasant settings enhances the beneficial effects of exercise.

An exercise regime should be of an activity that one enjoys. Millions of people who jog regularly are aware of the physical and psychological benefits of running. Approximately 40,000 people a year run in each of the Marathons in London and New York and this is a fraction of those who apply to participate in these events.
